Kucharski added that Dorothy was very involved back in 1988 very involved with the original agreement with the Keystone Sanitary Landfill.

Mayor Shimkus: The Hometown Heroes banners are done. Robert is picking them up tomorrow and will start to be installed this week. Expecting 200 - 250 people at the civic center Friday night for the Mayor's reception. Everything looks great.

Magliocchi: How many banner's did you get?

Mayor Shimkus: We originally had 73 brackets which we thought would be the first phase. We now have 95 with 5 more requests. So close to 100.

Barnick: Did you have a parade arranged like Olyphant?

Mayor Shimkus: Just our reception.

Audience comments on tonight's agenda:

Denise Brown, 197 Phillips St.: With regards to this gentleman's request to help with his sewer. When the sewer lines were put in - in Throop - was it mandatory for the residents to have them put in?

Kucharski: You are talking about the 1930's

Tanana: 1968 was when the ordinance

Brown: Yes I heard you mention an ordinance higher than 1968 -inaudible- was it mandatory, because I am listening to you talk about other properties in the area that have cess pools still

Kucharski/Tanana: Potentially, we don't know that.

Brown: Well I think that you do so

Kucharski: Well we don't

Tomasovitch: I don't know.

Magliocchi: the only way we know is if somebody has an issue like he does.

Brown: So the question being was it mandatory for every homeowner to connect to those lines and if so who over saw that?

Magliocchi: Well I am not going to disagree. I have plenty of issues on my street.

Brown: When you purchase a home you sign up and you are automatically told you have to pay a septic/sewer bill you presume your hooked up to it. I am really curious why Throop is taking no responsibility because if it was home I would be furious.

Kucharski: And we talked about the fact that house has probably been there since the 1930's again I lived there for 35 years.

Magliocchi: The only way, when you get connected to the sewer and you pay the sewer fee, that home owner that was previously there is they call the sewer authority and pay the connection fee. The sewer authority doesn't actually know if you are connected or not. You requested a hook up, the grant it, they give you the permit, they don't come out and inspect or anything. So why they went for the permit and didn't do it is beyond me but that's the fact of the matter.

Kucharski: Well there wasn't even a sewer authority back in the 30's.

Brown: it was actually 68.

Kucharski: This is just something that is really a fluke obviously.

Tanana: And there should have been connections on that side of the street for him to connect to which there is not on that line so I mean 2 wrongs don't make a right. We're just trying to make it right.

Magliocchi: I'm glad he is getting something done. When I did my house I was told you're on your own and I had to pay, cut across the road. I had to do the whole 9 yards. I'm glad they are doing something for you. They didn't for me.

Tanana: Added he had to cut across his

Brown: I just think it is the least the borough could do. Again when you purchase a home if there is any knowledge at all from somebody on council that you could be purchasing a home that still tied into a cess pool somebody should be made aware of that.

Tanana: Unless you camera everybody's personal sewer line you'll never get an answer to that.

Magliocchi: We are not legally obligated to go on the property. Some people won't let us. Like we've talked about other meetings, we have rain water running into the sewers. We can't go on somebody's property and inspect them.

Tanana: The only thing you can do is put the smoke down the sewer lines and look and see who's comes out of the gutters. Then you know who is illegal.

Magliocchi: Unfortunately people are doing that intentionally. Just not telling anybody.

Kucharski: Well again hopefully we will come up with a resolution for this gentleman.

Brown, You were speaking about an employee assistance program. What would that entail, I know for the state the EAP is you can call a nurse or you can call a mental health specialist. Is that what you are looking for?

Kucharski: Essentially yes. It is a recommendation. Let's say for example we terminated someone because they were an alcoholic or whatever and didn't take any steps to try to help them overcome that issue then that can become an issue that the borough would have to defend in any kind of arbitration related to that termination. We feel that since we are doing the handbook over, most businesses, governments etc. today have an employee assistance program. We don't.

Brown: So what expense would it be for Throop. Like would be responsible for -Inaudible- for employees to call.

Kucharski: That's something that has to be part of

Brown: You can't start a policy and not have anybody for the employees to call.

Kucharski: Exactly. That would be part of the program that we are asked to be developed.

Brown: So it's the \$5000.00 handbook that can potentially cost us more to have

Attorney Cimini: It was \$1500.00 not \$5000.00

Magliocchi: Which it hasn't been updated since 1996

Brown: I am all for updating the handbook but concerned about the EAP program. It seems rather expensive that the state has. Like where are we going with this.

Cimini: It was just recommended by DeHey McAndrew. We didn't implement it just have to review it.

Brown: I think you should give it a lot of thought. Again it could be very expensive.

Kucharski: We are asking how much it is going to cost.

Brown: So they would actually put everything into play and not just write out the words saying we have this policy in place.

Kucharski: I don't think they would put it in place. Probably the borough would have to get involved with that.

Tanana: We would have to.

Kucharski: that is all subject to what's in there and then we would have to try to develop something based on that.

Brown: maybe we should look at what it is going to cost to develop before we put it in.

Attorney Cimini: I will talk to them tomorrow. I will call first thing.

Brown: Regarding the demolition of the building, the company that won the bid came in significantly lower than the rest of them. How many change orders and how much expense are

we going to accrue?

Tomasovitch: Asked Robert that. Why it was so low and he said because there is a lot of stuff in the church that they could sell and make money on.

Magliocchi: you also have to realize that the borough has a lot of money and a lot of these contractors know that and that's why a lot of them come in high. It's happened in the past. We couldn't get a low bid on a lot of projects even though it should be low. We rejected a lot of them. That's the reality part of it.

Brown: I am just curious how many change orders are going to happen.

Magliocchi: Everything is in the specs what they have to do. The specs are everything that we need done so in order for them to get a change order, even with the light company. They messed up and they wanted a change order, want an extra \$5000. We told them too bad. That's your bid.

Attorney Cimini: 2 things on that. Robert and the borough have worked with this contractor before and Robert is very happy with their work and as too the amount that was bid, the contractor really saw some value in the contents of the church that would offset their cost and is why their bid was so much lower.

Brown: Thank you.

Jim Barnick, George St.: This landfill expansion, you read a letter. What was that an update or a revision? To phase III. Or is that — new updates? I mean. All the faces up here on council changed since the original application and many things changed in the application so everybody should be made aware of all the changes. The times reported they are going 165 feet higher and all this other stuff. This is the stuff you need to know and I think you should actually put a motion on to send three of you up there if you want that mutual cooperation. Sit down and discuss some matters.

Kucharski: That's what I said.

Attorney Cimini: I think what Jim is referring too is #19 I believe that is, it's dated February of 2014 the original one. Then there is another - It is in Robin's office. May 25, 2017 Assessment review. This is a binder that is in Robin's office.

Magliocchi: It came in last week.

Barnick: Is it an addition to the modification? What is it?

Attorney Cimini read the title: Environmental Assessment Review dated 5/25/17. Sent to DEP, Throop, Dunmore

Barnick: So that's the Environmental Assessment Review?

Attorney Cimini: yes.

Lombardo: that's actually online too.

Barnick: You read off a correspondence and it has a lot of effect on all this.

Kucharski: Lou can you take a look at that and report to us exactly what it entails?

Barnick: Are you going to attempt to meet?

Attorney Cimini: We're supposed to meet. We should. Form a committee to go up and talk.

Barnick asked if the whole council could go up because it's potential litigation.

Tomasovitch: 3 can go.

Magliocchi: Robin put a motion on to form a committee to go negotiate and I'll be on it.

Tomasovitch: And I'll be on it.

Kucharski: I'll be on it.

Barnick: Last thing Rich, on Bruno Dr. They ran a lateral to that one house up there at the end.

Magliocchi: They did. I had to run my own.

Barnick: It's not fair to him.

Kucharski: You're right. I agree with you.

Tanana: We have the motion on for the lateral to go with a clean out to his curb.

Barnick: I know we have extended sewers in certain places off of George St. There, up through the alley ways. The compliance was within 150 feet of the sewer line you are supposed to be hooked up. But that was way back in the 60's.

Magliocchi: It still reads that way.

Barnick: And it should still read that way. -----hooked up except for the ones that had sand mounds and stuff like that. And they were the only ones that were supposed to be inspected by DEP.

Magliocchi: Technically on Bruno Dr. They ran a whole new sewer line because the guy wasn't hooked up. Technically in his favor he isn't hooked up.

Tanana: Well Bob that's not the entire truth. I mean

Magliocchi: It is.

Tanana: You have private lines you had a sewer problem, the borough could not legally touch that line.

Magliocchi: So you're saying that is a private line but they took over the street so you're saying every street

Magliocchi and Tanana talking at once.

Tanana: right Jim? The Palumbo line and the Coviello line were both private lines.

Barnick: I don't know

Magliocchi: didn't specify that it was taken over when they took over the street so now if you go back in and look when we took over every street and it doesn't specify the sewer that means they are all private lines. You can't argue that one. It's wrong.

Kucharski: Well it's over. It's done. The public line is in.

Tanana: Even if the Palumbo line was a public line it wasn't good enough to service anybody there anyway.

Magliocchi: It was working. The lady next door.

Kucharski: Well again, there is a motion to help this gentleman.

Rob Torch, 100 George St: I want to piggy back on something the Mayor said about the town hall meetings. Chalet be a minimum of 3. Can use Mid Valley High School. I'm sure people would come out for that. I think that is a good idea and is one of my reasons for coming here. Number 2 is I like the idea of three council members going face to face to DeNaples because that is how business was done back in the day. Face to face. Hands to hands. Eye to eye. Those contracts that we are talking about now, they were done that way. And they should be remained to be done that way. No letter until resolution in person is discussed. Whether it be yay or nay then a letter sent. That's my opinion.

Kucharski: Right.

No audience comments on this motion.

On the question:

Tanana questioned if full time/part time/both?

Tomasovitch: Both.

Magliocchi: All police officers.

Tomasovitch: You have to be qualified with a gun to do your job.

Tanana: Inaudible, bargaining unit.

Williams: Inaudible, have to be qualified with the gun at least once a year.

Tomasovitch added that there is someone at the sheriffs office that can't qualify and can't work.

Tanana: I know we have qualifying twice a year.

Musewicz asked if there are some concerns.

Tomasovitch: Yes.

Musewicz: Are there some concerns that there may be some people that aren't qualified. Some police officers.

Tomasovitch: Yes.

Kucharski: Is that the only issue we are concerned about or are there other issues that they require to be certified?

Williams: No, inaudible, requires once a year. Our department has a policy it qualifies in the spring and the fall.

Musewicz questioned if we have brought his to the Mayor's attention.

Williams: I believe it has been brought to his attention numerous times.

Tomasovitch: Numerous times.

All in favor

Motion carried

Audience comments:

Zilla: questioned motion #8, the liability insurance that the borough carries. When we had our short lived activities committee and we talked about running bus trips and we needed additional liability insurance. Wouldn't it fall under this liability insurance?

Attorney Cimini: That was a recommendation from the insurance company that the borough be added as an additional insured on a separate policy. In any event in the borough that's what happens. I understand what you're saying. There is insurance but that insurance is for borough property, borough vehicles, borough equipment.

Magliocchi: I don't see the difference at the end of the day if something happens on the bus the bus is covered and if something happened on borough property we are covered.

Attorney Cimini: But our insurance company is saying, their opinion to us is we need a one day policy or special exception policy - inaudible.

Zilla: So it wouldn't fall under that.

Attorney Cimini/Kucharski: No.

Frank Galli, 609 Kossuth St.: Spoke of 4 trees that have fallen at the cemetery across the street in the past couple of months. It's a situation if they keep falling down. Spoke to the people from the cemetery and they are a non profit organization. They have no money. My question is - is there anything you can do being that they are a non profit organization they don't have any money. Now it becomes a situation. Now it's becoming a nuisance. We are bringing out firefighters to come out and chop up these trees. There could be potential for disaster for a tree falling on a citizen, car or a house. I think the borough has to help out some way or figure out a resolution to this.

Kucharski: I saw those trees after we talked and they are in bad shape. They are evergreens and pretty much dead. And they're tall.

Galli: They are tall and they don't have any money. They are a non profit organization.

Kucharski: Those of you who are long time residents that cemetery was associated with the Logan Presbyterian Church that burned down on George St. There are trustees to the cemetery but they don't have any funds from what I understand. Lou do you have an opinion?

Attorney Cimini: From a legal perspective I think you should send them a letter that they have to take the trees down. Because we are on notice now that the trees are an issue.

Kucharski: I know Bob Lokuta has talked to them and they said they would see what they can do.

Galli: A couple years back, Jim maybe you can help me out with this, didn't your family give the borough the cemetery give the borough some land back there to the road back there. Didn't they deed some of the land over to them or something?

Jim Walsh, George St.: On the issues that you are talking about I am not in and official capacity. They are all in laws. I understand what you're saying. As far as the first issue, there is going to be a big tree cutting party on Labor day weekend. That will be taken care of is what I want to say. 8-10 people will be there with some equipment. Will take care of that.

Galli: It did give land to the borough of Throop to do that project up there with the road.

Walsh: Yes, I remember conversations about it.

Attorney Cimini: Didn't you just say the issue is going to be resolved anyway?

Tomasovitch: Yes the issue is going to be resolved.

Galli: When I did talk to them they said they couldn't afford it. But that's great news that they are going to do something about it.

Kucharski: Great. We will see what happens. Otherwise we will have to send a letter and take it from there.

Galli: The civil service thing is almost wrapped up.

Kucharski: Great.

Jim Barnick, George St.: As far as the landfill negotiating committee; don't you think you should put the people with real concerns on the committee? To go up. Charlene doesn't have any concern. She voted it down.

Tomasovitch: I can go.

Barnick: You don't have concerns though.

Tomasovitch: Well I want to go.

Barnick: You have people up there that have real concerns. Isn't your son working for him.

Tomasovitch: No he's not.

Jim Barnick: How is he not?

Tomasovitch: Because he doesn't. He doesn't sign his check. He's not his direct contact. He has no affiliation

Jim Barnick: He works for N&L correct?

Tomasovitch: No he doesn't. Sorry.

Kucharski: What I was thinking, probably the best way to handle it would be in a work session come up with a list of concerns and get concerns from everybody, not just 3 people just going up. I want to hear the actual concerns we will bring to the table.

Lombardo: And bring the response back.

Kucharski: Right. And then that would determine our next step if any. I think that is the best way to handle it personally.

Barnick: How long is this going to take?

Kucharski: We can do it for the next meeting. We'll put it on for the next work session that, actually if everybody can do their due diligence and bring their lists with them then that will save us some time and we will go from there.

Bob Torch: I want to bring up a side subject other than the landfill. The excessive speeding on Edgar St. Coming form the college on the top of the hill where Rob lives all the way down to Charles. There is only 2 or 3 speed signs on the street. Especially the stretch between the top of

Edgar and the corner of George where I live. 1 speed sign is underneath the tree and is actually growing inside the tree. Something needs to be done about that. Freeing it up making it more public maybe more signs added. The excessive speeding especially around that curb is ridiculous. Tomasovitch: Have Robert check that sign out.

Kucharski: What we have done just recently on other streets with similar complaints we put speed bumps and they work.

Magliocchi: They do work but we also have the device we bought for the police station where we it's a vas guarding, it calculates the speed of cars, what time of the day and everything. We had it hung and never heard the results. Once again. But anyway we can look into having them hang on that street. I don't know if we need a motion. Just to get the speed and time of day. Maybe instead of speed bumps we can have the police patrol it.

Torch: I was talking to the police officers and they said part of their routine is to patrol the perimeter of Throop. I do say they go by.

All talking at once.

Kucharski: The one particular corner is bad.

Magliocchi: It is. It's a blind corner.

Torch: It is a blind corner. They come whipping around there and there is 1 watch children sign and it is obsolete in its current position because you can't see it when you are driving up. Maybe want to add a blinking red lights to the speed limit signs. Something needs to be done there.

Magliocchi: Have to do something to do that.

Torch: Something needs to be done. I've been there since 1997. Living in Throop since 1989. That's a long time to be here. I am 45 years old. I've seen a lot. Back in the day when I bought that house it was a quiet section of the neighborhood. And now it is the busiest section because everyone uses it as a cut through. The armory people speed through. Maybe a warning can be sent to their command. The excessive speeding needs to be

Kucharski: Bob do you want to talk to Keith. I will gladly talk to him.

Magliocchi: I can too. I mean I had this conversation that's why I'm getting frustrated. When I don't see results, I'm an impatient guy I like to see stuff get done. We had issues on other streets where we never even saw the results. I will be more than glad to talk to him. I'm not happy with it.

Torch: I see the police, they do their job.

Magliocchi: I'm not saying ticket everybody. Give everybody warnings. If I start pulling you over 10 times I've got to give you a ticket. It's got to end somewhere.

Torch: A lot of the people speeding are the younger generation. Coming from the construction, cutting through, they want to avoid the construction. It's excessive. Someone is going to get hurt. I just moved my mother in a year and a half ago across the street from me - caddy corner. I walk across the street all the time and I literally have to have eyes in the back of my head. I cannot cross that road without worrying about getting hit. Or somebody coming around there that blind corner speeding doing 40 mph when it's only posted 20. The signs are far few and between one is actually obstructed growing into a tree.

Magliocchi: They even painted lines up there didn't they? Up the hill?

Williams: Yes.

Torch: When they come rolling down that hill. Momentum is going to carry them at 30 mph. Put on the pedal and it will carry them to 40-45.

Kucharski: It is an issue and we'll have to talk to the chief and see what we can do. Perfect location for speed bumps in my occasion.

Lokuta: The 500 block of Edgar street it is pretty tough to get through the block. Especially with the trailer parked there. It takes 3/4 of that area. It has a license but is parked there for very long

extended periods of time and if a car is coming one way you have 2-3 cars blocked on either end and you can't get through.

Kucharski: If someone is parked directly across from the trailer a fire truck cannot get through there.

Lokuta: Correct.

All talking at once.

Kucharski: I discussed this with Keith and he was very frustrated too. He talked about previously there was an issue several years back on Murray street where someone was parking a tractor trailer there and it is a similar issue. They passed some sort of ordinance but I think it only pertained to there. He was going to research it and see what type of ordinance we may be able to pass to at least modify the issue. The other thing is it is a narrow street. 2 sided parking probably is not a very good fit for that street. Can have just parking on one side.

Torch: I agree with that. I think at one time in front of my house there was a no parking this side right before the stop sign. That got knocked down in a snow storm back in 2001 and was never put back up. The trailer - there is a dead end street right there why can't it be parked there? Just tell him to park it there.

Kucharski: There is a drive way and a garage

Torch: They have other cars going in and out.

Magliocchi: the bottom line is we have to pass something in order to do something with the trailer.

Kucharski: Keith was going to look into that but unfortunately he wasn't here tonight.
