Dolan-The Home Program for the month of October paid out to contractors and residents the amount of \$34,165.00 and that's what we received from the grant. We also paid out, our rehab service for the month of October, to Marvin Brotter, \$100.00. The checkbook balance as of today is \$724,536.53. If all items for payment are approved tonight the balance will be \$635,325.08. If all motions tonight get approved, which the only two motions I have is the Sunny Day and the fee for the PSAT that Attorney Cimini will be attending which amounts to \$63,751.60, the balance will be \$571,573.48.

On the question:

Barone-I brought up the motion up last meeting, I wanted to see the figures for it before I vote on this.

Lukasewicz-Maybe we should table it, being the cost is a factor on this.

Barnick-I'd like to see a cost factor on this.

Dolan-It's over \$500 a family.

Marushock-\$500 per family?

Dolan-Per family, if you have a family plan....

Marushock-So for seven to eight of us, that's like \$4,000. Is that per year or per month?

Barnick-I, myself, I'm not going to be using it.

Mayor-I can't either (inaudible).

Marushock-I have (inaudible) through my employer. Again, I would like to see the cost factor and some stipulations.....

Dolan-A family a month is \$753.91. (Husband, wife and children.) Husband and wife is \$722.66 (per month). Now, every month this bill changes. A single person is \$311.54 per month. That's just one individual. That's Blue Cross, Blue Shield and Major Medical, Dental and Vision. They have everything, full time employees.

A long discussion took place.

Lukasewicz-That's what I think the plan is.

Mayor-That's what the plan is, yes.

Barnick-You're going to go through the cost of putting details on this thing and everything else all over again? Is it road worthy?

Barone-You have to include there that you have to get rid of Robbie's car and give him the Dare.

Barnick-Lou, we have to look at this thing now, is there any wording (inaudible) where they can't just come in here and say, we're going to use this department, that department, and this one whenever they want?

Cimini-I don't think.....

Barnick-You're sure?

Cimini-Yes. If you want me to look at it again, I'll look at it again.

Barnick-I just want to make sure that they're not allowed to take control with this.

Marushock-We had a meeting and there was some representatives from the Lackawanna County and overall (inaudible) the point was brought up one of the concerns of the borough was that they don't take our borough employees and use it throughout the town (inaudible) and I believe that's all written into the agreement where that's not going to happen.

Barnick-That is not written into the agreement, let's get that straight. I want it put in there, very specific, the only authority they have is support and not use our department for any reason whatsoever, unless it's approved by council.

To replace the sanitary sewer manhole on Eddy St. as per the proposal from Scranton Craftsmen at a cost of \$4,990.00.

On the question:

Barnick-Did we get three phone quotes on this?

Morrell-Robert did have three quotes.

Kalinoski-They were written bids, they were submitted in May when we did the Goodman Street manhole, (inaudible) contacted Mark Kozik from Scranton Craftsmen last Thursday and asked him if he would still hold his bid price and he said yes.

Barnick-And this is the lowest one out of the three.

Kalinoski-This is the lowest, yes. Do you have the sheet? If you want, I can get you copies...

Barnick-No, just a point I want to make about this. To understand that problem about this Eddy Street, Nemerovitch family had sewer gas, they were gassed out. I know they tried to contact you, Mr. Lukasewicz, and they couldn't get a hold of you. That's normal, but....

Lukasewicz-When did you they try to get a hold of me?

Barnick-.....this sewer line has been a problem for, we had this on and it was supposed to go out, just talking to the borough employee's, Chuckie and them said they were pulling out chunks of pipe, so how long is it going to last? You're going to put another band-aid on another sewer line for sidewalks. I'm going to vote for it because it's got to be fixed but as far as the sewer line, here we go again. Ten months, not one sewer line's been done. Not one.

To authorize Robert Kalinoski, Street Commissioner to hydro-seed along the levy and Lackawanna River in the Spring of 2002.

On the question:

Marushock-This was discussed previously. We planned on doing it now but they suggested we do it in the spring time so that the seeding was take seed and have.....

Barnick-The levy and the river, looking great. They're doing a good job down there. I only think it's time to get the Army Corps. of Engineers in here and get some plumbing for this whole river and bank because they may have some specific issues that have to be addressed before they're going to go out and provide funding. The hydro-seeding, it's over \$4,000? Three vote quotes?

Kalinoski-I won't know, Jim, until I measure that.....

Barnick-It's a pretty long area, right? It's got to be about a thousand, maybe more?

Kalinoski-It's probably right over a thousand.....

Barnick-Are you talking from the bridge now, all the way up?

Kalinoski-We didn't get that far yet so I don't know what to expect when I get around the corner. A lot of that area was done by the Lackawanna River Corridor Association a few years ago so I don't think I have to go down into that area. They also have.....

Barnick-I think you have to go down there because some trees are stuck there inside of the river.

Kalinoski-They wanted some trees left along the embankment to keep the erosion down.

Barnick-I'm talking about the trees that are laying in the river itself.

Kalinoski-They actually wanted them there, Jim. That's was one of their requests. They asked us to *bring* the tree limbs and to put there.

Barone-Put trees in the river?

Kalinoski-Yes. Right down the corridor because it cuts down the erosion of the bank.

Barnick-What about the ice build up and everything else? The trees that are laying in the river. Who said this? The Lackawanna County or.....

Kalinoski-The Lackawanna County River Corridor Association.

Barnick-I think it's time to get a hold of them. (Everyone spoke at once)

Kalinoski-We did meet down there last week.

Barnick- Did they say they wanted them in the river?

We didn't go down that far. What we did on the Sulphur Creek, I'm expecting a permit hopefully this week so we can clear the sediment from Sulphur Creek.

Motion #19 failed as follows:

To authorize Change Order # 2 regarding the Bellman St. Park to install walkways from the access road to the basketball court and to Wrable's property at a cost of \$3,797.44. Also to install two gates, one to Wrable's Property and one to Sklareski's property at a cost of \$1,200.00.

On the question:

Barnick-I propose another way. I think the other way was better, not only because I proposed it but just, everybody's got a copy of this map, I want everybody to see this. To me, is asinine. To do something like this is asinine, to drive through the middle of a park, to drive through some gates, I didn't come up with this and won't agree with it, I'm telling you. I proposed to put a 10' access along side this property, right up along side, and put some gravel, a gravel road, access type. It didn't matter if it was paved or not, gravel access, it was a ride in, add it right into the park. Cost would be labor only because you take the fence that's presently there, move it back 10' feet, take a piece that's out in the bottom, take that piece, put it up the top, take the poles out, break the concrete away and reset the poles and you're done. Restretch(?) the fence but, apparently, that wasn't good enough. Now we're going to have cars driving through the park while kids are playing. Whether they use it a lot or not, it matters none to me. It takes one time, and it takes one time for a person to go down that hill, steep incline, they're going to end up in Dickson City or at least the river (inaudible). But to do something like this, you're talking \$5,000, \$5,000 there, the lawyer's have to spend hours on an agreement between all the residents. The other way you don't need an agreement at all, just take care of the property. This, you have 10' that they want to take away from the park but here, we sit here, and you have a piece of the borough property right below that. You didn't want to take away from the park, didn't want to give the land away, but you're going to keep the borough's land (inaudible).

Marushock--Just to add to this, we as a group, council.....

Barnick-No, not we.

Chrzan-Don't say we as a group.

Marushock-We did meet at the sight (everyone spoke at once.)

A discussion ensued.

Marushock-A big part of this project, again, just to let everyone know, (inaudible) amounts that we are talking about, it's not exclusively for that driveway, we did have residents who also suggested that blacktopping of part of that area would be a good benefit to people, especially young mothers and stuff with strollers.

Everyone spoke at once, a discussion ensued.

Official Comments/Discussions:

Barnick-Wants to place on the record with regard to the pension executive session, he was aware of what the audit says and wants to make sure the record reflects he will not be held liable for pension payments that are paid by that or any future payments, until this is resolved. He said he was not part of this when it was done and he suggested stop payment. In addition, he indicated he stated why he would not attend the executive session because an independent authority such as the Civic Service Commission, an independent authority, should have not met in an executive session and no authority meets with another authority to discuss personnel matters. He also discussed the articles in the newspaper about Keystone Sanitary Landfill, in particular, one family getting that much money for a piece of land that was never, in his opinion, permitted as a landfill area back in 1994. The new highway was going in at that time and he thought it was a disgrace, this possible award. In addition, the deed was received (and filed) for the 48 acres of land. There was supposed to be an ordinance developed to condemn whatever was necessary for access to the property.

Lukasewicz clarified the solicitor is in the process of reviewing the pension and would make a recommendation. He also asked the solicitor if he thought there were any problems with the executive session that was held and the solicitor indicated none. Also, a meeting/discussion was needed to get back to the land (access). A meeting and negotiations would be needed with the ambulance as no bids came in (for the 2nd time). With regard to the Bellman Street Park, he would vote against anything down there and was not changing the park whatsoever.

Marushock-Indicated there was still hot spots on the 48 acres site.

Keyasko-Said to tell everyone about the study that was done in 1974 about that land up there that the borough wanted to buy and it would cost more for the foundation than anything.

Barone-Wanted to see the ambulance services for the borough re-bid again. He asked if council would think about the fence again (with regard to Bellman Street Park) and wanted to make a motion on it again, to change the fence (move the fence).

22. Motion by Barone

Seconded by Chrzan

The following motion failed:

To move the fence and to provide access to the Bellman Street Park because of safety for children.

Barone-And to keep peace down there with those people.

On the question:

Marushock-Here we again with the liability of crossing over the borough property and parking (inaudible) to get to this.....we're back to square one again. The solution that was on the table earlier this evening, when we met there (inaudible) being that we were there and had a chance to review this right on site instead of looking at a piece of paper, that was the best solution that we had come up with. This is not any better. You've still got a problem with this.

Barone-What's not better?

Marushock-You're going to have to cross over the borough property to get access into the yards.
Barone-So?

Marushock-Plus, you're taking away 10' wide by about how long is that?

Barone-That land's not going to be used.

Marushock-It was used.

Barone-Who's going to use it? It's right next to the fence. But what do you people want? You want the fence moved, you want.....(everybody spoke at once).

Barnick-I'm going to state it just the way I stated it at the work session. Them people had access to that property. Whether it was legal, whether the sale was legal, whatever. It's all legal now. Them people had access to that property (everyone spoke at once). They access for years down there and it's no different than having these paper alleyways and paper courts through out this town and say okay, we're going to vote to close every one of them. It's no different, cutting them off down there. We'll just deprive everybody, I can take your alleyway down there (Rocco) that's down behind your house and say I want to vote to close that. No different. How do you think them people feel about it? And to move that fence over is very limited cost because all you pay is labor and you have the DPW put some gravel in. All the problems are solved, everybody's happy.

Marushock-It's not solved.

Keyasko-If they had access to it before, how did they have access to it?

Barnick-Right through the land, drove right it.

Keyasko-Is it in their deeds? Is it in their deeds? I'm asking you a question. Is it in their deeds to go in their property?

Three on favor-Barone, Barnick, Chrzan

Four against-Marushock, Mellody, Keyasko, Lukasewicz

Motion failed

Lukasewicz-Like I stated just a few minutes ago before this came up again, I'm against doing anything with access-way for any citizen.....(everyone spoke at once).

Barone-You're just against.....

Lukasewicz-I'm against any access to any land owner down there. There's no good solution to this.

Jim Mellody-Indicated some documentation had come into his possession that shows that the Summer Camp Day Care Program purchased R and PG-13 rated videos on July 15th, 2001 and he was trying to get inventory for months.

Mayor Lukowski:

Mentioned at the last Civic Center Blood Drive 116 donors came forth. He brought up Eddy Street and the sewers being severely damaged and that damage being done by Gould. He said he brought it up numerous times and they ignored the pleas to get it fixed. They got out of town and left the thing in disarray. They (Gould) should have fixed that road, those sewers. Not this community, not this borough, they raped it enough. He thanked Elaine and Christina for invaluable assistance for awards presentations, on a moments notice.

Elaine Morrell-Thanked the Mayor and said we should thank Superior Trophy, they are excellent. They'll make up whatever we want and they'll do it on a moments notice.

Audience Comments:

Daryl Menichetti, North Street-Wanted to know if the Civic Center was showing R-rated movies.

Frank Galli, 609 Kossuth Street-Said he thought once again this was a blatant dig at the former director to bring his name down and asked why this brought up at a public meeting. He then questioned is the police department is involved in filing complaints at the magistrates office? Is the police department involved if a citizen of Throop wanted to file a civil complaint against a person in this town and would the police department help? He said his point was a complaint brought against the former director over name calling, the police was involved but did not witness it.

Lenore Dolan-Asked who the solicitor was before Mr. Cimini and asked Mr. Marushock to go through all of his bills because of voting against his fee every month. She mentioned the Civic Center calls him for legal advice constantly and you never, not once, see him bill us. When the civic center organization started the other solicitor agreed to come to the meetings for \$100. per hour, they were given one hour with him. Since he has been solicitor he has never billed for the Civic Center. She said if his bills were itemized, his bill would be more monthly.

Councilman Keyasko-In response asked how the bills were sent to the borough and stated they were supposed to be itemized, per hour.

Councilman Marushock-Responded he wanted everyone to know there was a proposal from another lawyer for the borough for approximately half of what we're paying our current solicitor and he had made the suggestion to put it out to bid. He mentioned If we have a problem with that one solicitor or attorney, he's not the only one out there, and to solicit other bids. There was a written proposal for approximately half of what we're paying right now.

Councilman Barone-Asked why the solicitor was not asked to figure out how many hours he worked and what his pay is and then we would see if this other lawyer is going to do the same. He said if our solicitor gets \$75,000 a year he deserves \$100,000 his pay comes to \$44. per hour and a paralegal makes more than that.

Andy Lisko, 205 Sanderson Street-Questioned/discussed the posting and fencing and signs on the river dykes and Sulphur Creek dyke. He said there's four fences put up taking his excess from the back of his property and he felt it was open for 45 years and now feels that these fences are unsafe in case of a flood, which way would he run, would he hop over fences? And the fencing was dangerous and shouldn't be there. He said six years ago when the Lackawanna River almost overflowed he had to get out that way. For forty five years kids walked down, they'd go fishing, everybody used it, and then certain individuals declare it as private property. He thought the borough is down there now spending thousands of dollars cleaning up private properties and

wanted to know what was going on. Who has the right to put up fences and stop the taxpayers from walking the dykes and enjoying the river banks? Dickson City has no fences over there and people were jogging and walking. Years back there was talk in the borough making a nature trail down there and it never materialized. Throop don't have the river dykes like Dickson City but what we do have should be opened to the people, not fenced off for somebody's selfish reasons. The kids don't come down because there's fencing there and another one just went up and he said he can't get off his property unless he goes onto Marjol now. He asked the solicitor to find out the do's and don'ts on the dykes, the Sulphur Creek dyke and the river dyke and said he knew there shouldn't be any digging at the top of the dyke.

Lukasewicz asked Kalinoski to address the issue.

Kalinoski-Mentioned that he didn't know and was trying to get information either from DEP or the Army Corps. of Engineers. Nobody in either department seems to be able to pinpoint that project. From what we know it was done in Olyphant, Dickson City, Blakely, Throop and also the Lackawanna County Commissioners are listed in the letter that we found. Nobody has any information on it at DEP and nobody from the Army Corps. of Engineers has been able to find anything. Between the phone calls that he has made and also our engineer, so he did not have an answer. A discussion ensued.

23. Motion by Barnick

Seconded by Chrzan

To have the solicitor review the dyke system, for having anything put on it, and what can or can't be done on a dyke, Sulphur Creek and the Lackawanna River.

All in favor

Motion carried

Dominick Rocco, 110 Sanderson St-Didn't think the tapes should be put in the paper and said there were no street signs on the corner of Sanderson and Bellman.

Marion Veltri, George Street -Wanted to know if there was any plan for the parking on George Street.

A discussion took place.

Marushock-Said he believed that situation for the 300 block of George Street is going to get even worse.

Barnick-Said there is a traffic regulation where if a person has a lot, a commercial lot, must use it or he could be fined. We should implement it and get it done. A few years ago he said the borough should take over George Street because we also plow it, we salt it, we fix the storm drains and we get permits for every sewer job we have there. We take the road over, get so much per mile and you could make the parking on either side, whatever you have to do. But otherwise, anything you do right now - it's a state road and you have to go down there and get it approved through PennDOT before you do anything which is ridiculous. He reiterated he brought it up many times already that the borough could take that road over and do what they have to do there.

To negotiate with PennDOT to take possession of George Street, from Sanderson Street to Old Dunmore Street, take it back.

Three in favor-Barone, Barnick, Chrzan

Two Against-Marushock, Lukasewicz

Two Abstain-Mellody, Keyasko

Motion carried

Joe Palumbo, Clark Street-Asked when the borough going to take over the roads in Tiffany Estates. He discussed everyone complaining that Tiffany Estates is flooding. He said when he was the street commissioner in this town and it rained that you couldn't travel that road the next day because the ruts were do deep and used to have to go down and grade that road. Storm sewers were put in many other places and he wanted to know why wasn't a storm sewer put in down there. What did the borough ever do for Tiffany Estates, he asked. These guys were out crucifying them (Tiffany) when they were beautifying the town. There's ten homes down there and go down and look at it. He asked why there wasn't a sewer down on Oleckna Street and that there was a french drain down on Oleckna. He said they have a french drain in a state road there and nobody was doing anything about it. A discussion took place. Note: paperwork in packet just received from Bob Bernosky with regard to Tiffany Estates.

George Barbolish, Cypress St-Had concerns with the Civic Center, Day Care Center (After School Program) and wanted to know what would happen if there was a fire in the basement and there was only one exit. (Someone clarified there are two exits.) He also said that Franko Street should be opened. He said he felt if the recent fire in Throop was on Martarano Drive it would not have been a good situation. He wanted to know why a police report was never/not read at a council meeting, without the reports going into great detail with names, etc.

Debbie Shevchik, 141 Harriet Street-Asked the names/titles of the movies and wanted to know what they were, and were they porno? She asked if they were maybe given as prizes and did he watch any of the movies?

Jim Mellody-Indicated the movies were r-rated and were Miss Congeniality, Meet the Parents, Me, Myself & Irene.

Neil Furiosi, 420 Ryan Street-Wanted to discuss Motion #12 with regard to the van. He indicated before anything was done with this van we should have a mechanic look at it to see if it's mechanically worthy. He went down to look at the van, the van wasn't there so he hasn't seen it. It has 140,000 miles on it but supposedly it runs like a champ. If a mechanic says it's worth it, then fine but he did wanted it checked.
